"That's funny—I've been thinking about the Land of Zork all day, also."

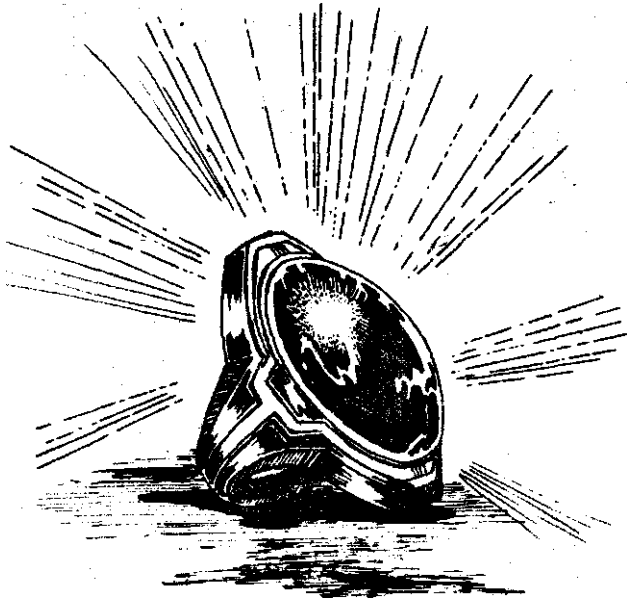
The Kingdom of Zork is a magical land far away, a land where Bill and June are known

"Let's go to the banquet," Bivotar decides. "I'm pretty hungry."

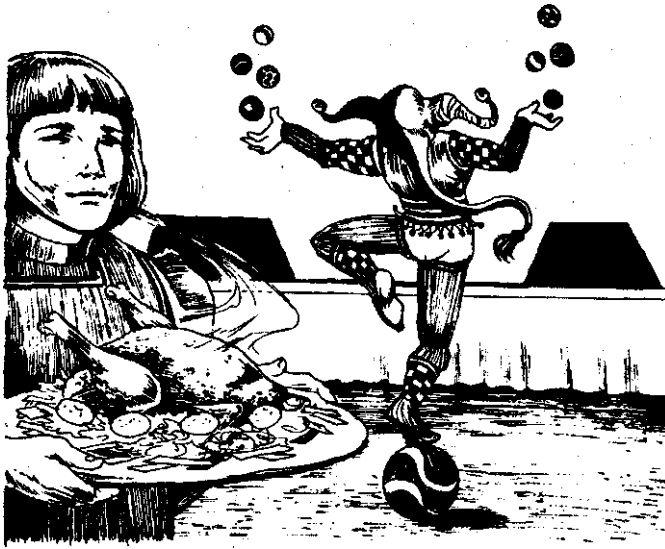
"Always found them to be noisy affairs," Syovar comments, "but if that's what you want..."

Miranda finally gives in to Bivotar's objection and abandons her idea of venturing into the enchanted cavern.

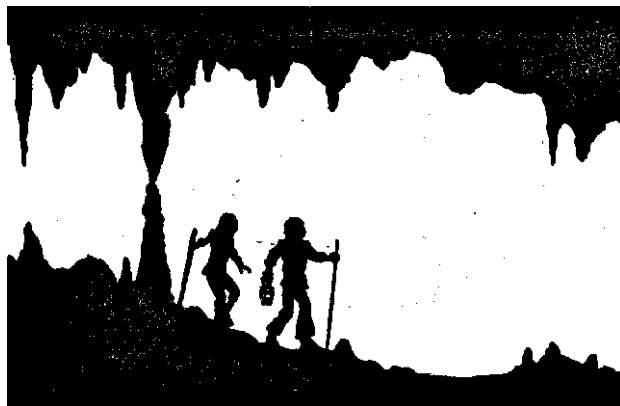

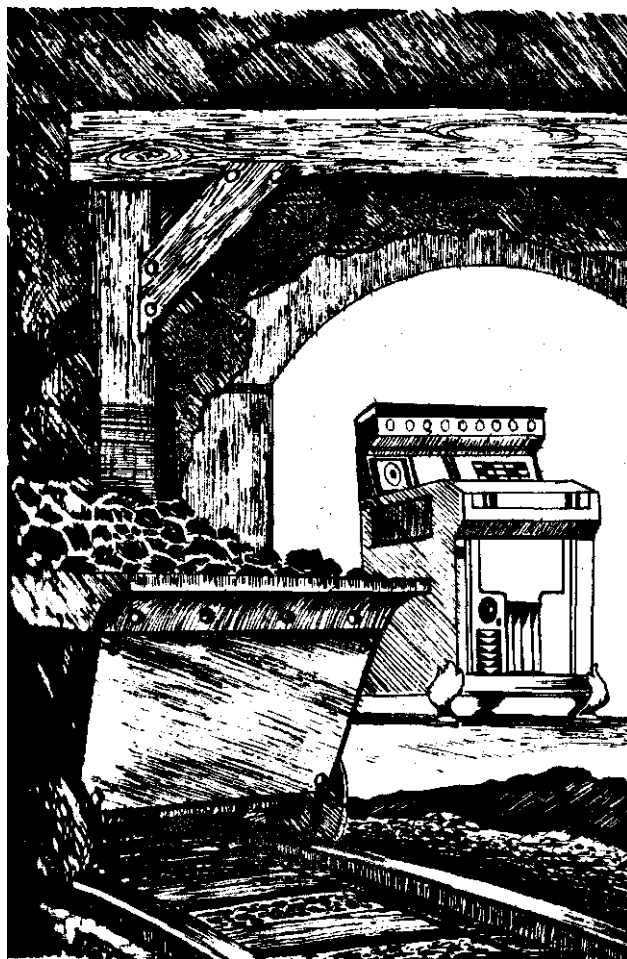

"But, wait a minute," says Bivotar. "There's a lot of coal out there in that bin. We could make a whole bunch of these diamonds!"

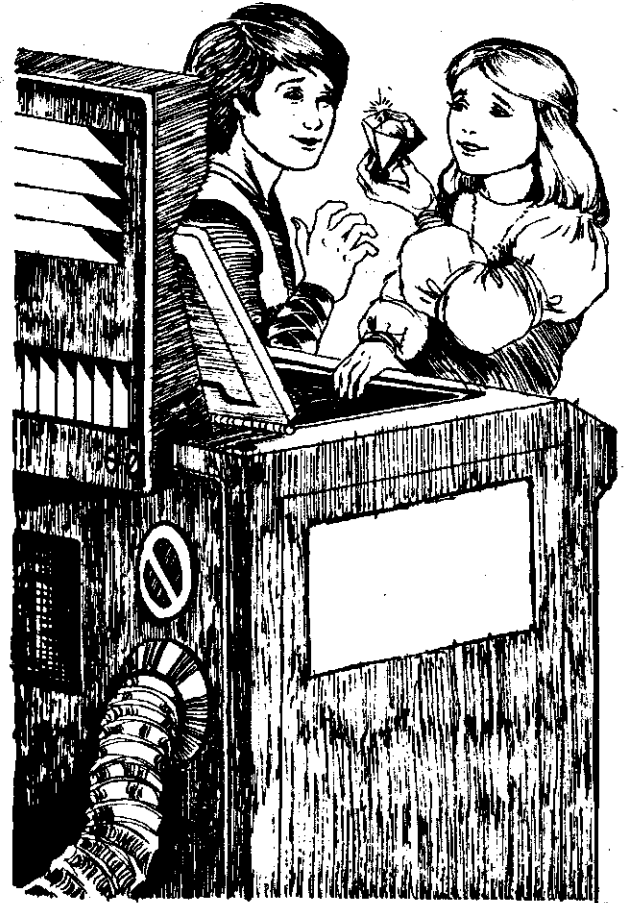
"That isn't what we came here for," protests Juranda.

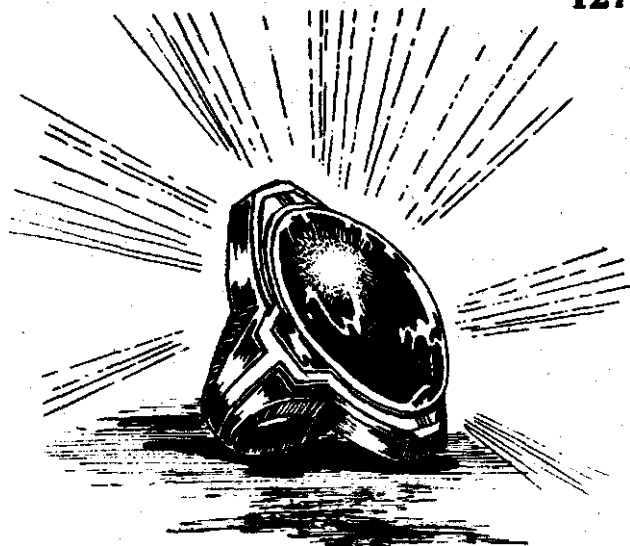
"Maybe Fred did find it first," admits Max.
